



The original *HMS Rose* was built in England and commissioned in 1757. The *Rose* cruised the American coast during the Revolutionary War and met her end off the coast of Savannah in 1779. A replica of the *Rose* was built in Lunenburg, Nova

Scotia some years ago. It is the world's largest active wooden sailing vessel. At 179 ft LOA and a main mast 130 ft tall, the *Rose* displaces 130 tons. Owned by Fox Studios, the ship is currently appearing in the 20th Century fox film *Master and*

<u>Commander: Far Side of the World</u> starring Russell Crowe and directed by Peter Weir. She is docked in San Diego.

However, in August 1998 the *Rose* was used as a sail training vessel. Atlanta Squadron's own (Master and) Commander Ed Troncalli, SN, served on a crew of 34 trainees that sailed the *Rose* from New York Harbor to Boston by way of Provincetown. At the general membership meeting on 23 Oct, Cdr Troncalli shared his experiences on that voyage with an exciting and interesting video

- <u>Joseph M. Sewell Navigator Memorial Trophy</u>: awarded for outstanding achievement in the Navigation course. This trophy is in memory of Joe Sewell, a former member of the Atlanta Squadron, and was designed by P/C Don Williams, SN.
- **Prince Henry Award**: awarded for the most Navigator grade A achievements (3rd year).
- <u>Dixie Navigation Club Navigator of the Year</u>: awarded for outstanding achievement in navigation skills. This year's award went to Lt/C Margaret Sherrod, JN, for scoring the highest grade on the Jr Navigation exam.

Commander's Helm Awards were presented to Lt Frank Taylor for his service as Vessel Safety Chair, and to Lt Nancy Spraker for her leadership of the BoatSmart program. Frank and his team completed more than sixty inspections and trained four new inspectors. In the most recent BoatSmart course, Nancy reported that nine students completed the course and passed the test.



AUSSIE RULES

Life must be tough for "The Shark." See what kind of boat golf could bring you?

Greg Norman, "The Shark", recently took delivery of his new toy, named *Aussie Rules*, which he helped design. At 228 feet in length, it's the world's largest aluminum and composite private yacht. He had it built for only \$70 million. The company meant to build it for him "at cost" in return for the excellent advertising of having him as an owner, but they actually lost money on it. When he first cruised into Sydney Harbor, onlookers remarked, "It's massive! Nearly three times the size of the ferries in the Harbor!"

Besides being opulent, it is also built for Jacques Cousteau-type fun and exploration. There is on-board diving equipment for 30 people including a decompression chamber and two huge compressors. Dives of all types can be accomplished by operating the Nitrox mixing panel onboard, ena-

bling each guest's air tank to be customized with a mixture of gases.

To get the people out to those choice dive spots, or maybe just for having a bit of a splash, the following additional "small" boats are kept onboard:

- A 42-ft Custom Built "Game Fisher" can be launched and retrieved from the deck. Perfect for a 4-person overnight fishing expedition. Has a gourmet galley for cooking up the catch while it's still fresh.
- A 30-ft SeeVee for a quick afternoon fishing trip.
- A 22-ft Novurania Equator with a meager 800 horsepower so you can get to the best diving sites ahead of everyone else. It has beach landing capability as well.
- Two 18-ft Hewes Bonerfishers for those special occasions when Greg and a close friend may wish to maneuver over the sand flats in Key West, FL
- A 13-ft Narwhal Rescue Boat in case someone falls off one of those other boats
- And just for the hell of it, four Yamaha Waverunners!




Afterthoughts
