
I am proud to be a part of a group of individuals who have not forgotten the

To address issues of Safe Boating Practices, Boating Education, Boating Registration and Licensing, Boating Resource User Conflicts, Statutory Authorities, and other Boating Safety Issues. The Council will not address issues of Dredging, Commercial Fishing Regulations and Navigable Streams.

The Council will meet as necessary to address issues and concerns of safe boating practices in Georgia. They plan to have a final report ready for governor by January 01, 2010.

P/C Ed Troncalli has been asked to serve on this important and prestigious council. Ed will ably represent ASPS, and will keep the squadron advised of its activities. Congratulations Ed!



DANGER CIRCLES


Since Lake Lanier is at historically low levels, I thought I would discuss "danger circles". Due to the hazards that are now above water in Lake Lanier, this is a historical opportunity to mark some of these hazards with a "danger circle". When the water level is restored, your paper charts and GPS will now have that "personal" knowledge recorded for you and your crew to pay special attention to

Here is how the US Power Squadron defines a "danger circle"


Danger Circle:

A charted circle centered on a feature, landmark or waypoint that is established to help the helmsman avoid hazards within the circle. Using GPS, an alarm can be set.

Let's look at chart #8 of the Lake Lanier Charts:



Now lets look at the hazards between Aqualand Marina and the entrance to Flowery Branch.



Most of us are very familiar with this area because we go by this area on many of our cruises. Notice the red arrows I have inserted to highlight the area that is currently all above ground.

You can mark this area with a waypoint and set up a danger circle. Most GPS's have the capability to set up a "proximity alarm" around a waypoint. A "proximity alarm" is another way to say "set up an alarm that will sound when you get to within a certain distance (that you select) or "proximity" of some object."

1. Using the waypoint function select a point near the middle of the hazard you intend to mark.

- 2. Mark this as a waypoint.
- 3. Go to "menu" for this waypoint and select "properties".
- 4. Select "proximity alarm". You will be prompted to set the radius (distance) of the circle. Select the radius that covers the hazards you want to avoid. Then select "on" or "off".
- 5. If you selected "on", an alarm will sound when you intrude inside this danger circle.



Marking the hazards that are clearly above water during this historically low water period for Lake Lanier is prudent. While doing this, extreme caution must be exercised as many more hazards are just below the surface. If you have not winterized your boat yet and plan to get out on

Lake Lanier, take a few moments to mark some exceptionally hazardous areas in your cruising area. Again let me remind you to use **extreme caution** (near idle speed when not in the center channel) as the lake is very dangerous at its current level. You and your crew will be appreciative that you marked these hazards when Lake Lanier returns to normal pool level in the future.

Remember, safe boating knowledge is not a destination it is a journey.
