All was well until one of the anchors let go and we all learned the answer to that age old question: "Will the Circle Be Unbroken?" At least for this raft-up, the answer was clearly "No".

Following a regroup in a more traditional raft-up configuration, the

participants enjoyed a great afternoon of fun and fellowship on the water.

2009 TENNESSEE RIVER TRIP: PICKWICK LAKE AND THE TENN-TOM

This year's annual Tennessee River Trip will take ASPS cruisers farther west than we have ever been before on the River.

We will gather at Ditto Landing on September 24 and 25, 2009. Ditto Landing is located on the Tennessee River near Huntsville, AL. Transient slips and trailer parking are available. For those who need a hotel room, the Radisson Hotel is nearby.

On Friday, September 25, we will depart Ditto Landing and cruise west to Florence Harbor Marina on the eastern edge of Pickwick Lake. We will pass through Wheeler National Wildlife Refuge, Gen. Joe Wheeler Lock and Dam and Wilson Lock, Dam and Hydro Power Plant. As in Huntsville, transient slips will be available at Florence Harbor Marina, and the Hampton Inn is only ½ mile away for bagdraggers.

Saturday, September 26 will see us cruising Pickwick Lake, to the north end of the Tennessee-Tombigbee Waterway. We will pass Seven Mile Island, the Colbert Steam Plant and Bear Creek. From Pickwick Lake we will take a southern turn into Yellow Creek, the northernmost part of the "Tenn-Tom", After a short cruise down the Tenn-Tom, we will return to Florence Harbor Marina and a Saturday night cocktail party and dinner out. And – for those who would rather fish than cruise, Pickwick Lake and Bear Creek offer abundant fishing areas.

We will return to Ditto Landing (alas!) on Sunday, September 27, and, from there, home to Atlanta.

LEADERSHIP TEAM PLANS MARKETING STRATEGY

On July 28 several members of the ASPS leadership team got together to discuss our marketing and public relations strategy and initiatives. Lt/C Lisa Herndon, AO and past Marketing Chair, hosted the meeting. Cdr Carol Jordan; XO Kevin Schoonover; P/Lt/C Sheryl LaBoda, Membership Chair; Lt Glenn LaBoda, Boat Show Chair; and P/C David Herndon participated.

Effective marketing is about understanding the product (membership in ASPS), its placement (how people know about us), its position (how ASPS membership is perceived relative to other ways people could spend their time and money) and its price (what does it cost to belong in money and time). Lisa led the group through a discussion of the importance of marketing effectively and what information we need from our members, prospective members, past members and the boating community

at large to be effective. The consensus is that we understand the product and the price fairly well, but we need to do a lot more work on placement and positioning.

The group spent some time brainstorming by suggesting attributes they would like to people to associate with ASPS. "Attributes" are those words or phrases we want to come to mind when people hear about ASPS? A lengthy list of suggestions such as "friendly", "competent", "welcoming", "funloving", "here for the long run" were suggested. The marketing team will begin building a consistent set of messages that incorporate these attributes, along with our "Safe, Smart, Fun" theme.

There was consensus that we should put more effort into emphasizing the Fun aspect of membership. Many prospective members seem to know that ASPS offers boating education and vessel safety checks, but they don't know about the raft-ups, cruises, and parties.


Over time, we will convey these messages through articles, brochures, advertisements, presentations, our website, Facebook and one-on-one encounters with prospective members. The team also put together a list of Frequently Asked Questions about ASPS that conveys the basic information a prospective member might be interested using verbiage built around the some of the key attributes. These FAQs were debuted at the BoatSmart class on Aug 1. After some time survey tools will be used to assess how well the message is getting across and help the team determine how to take corrective action.

NEW OWNER FOR ON-THE-WATER TOWBOAT COMPANY ON LAKE LANIER

Capt. Robert Estrada has purchased TowBoatUS Lake Lanier, GA, an on-the-water towing company that recreational boaters can call to get reliable assistance day or night. Battery jump starts, fuel drop offs, ungrounding services and tows back to a launch ramp are the most common requests.

While lake water levels have rebounded from last year's drought conditions, the U.S. Coast Guard licensed Estrada says boaters continue to have issues with underwater obstructions. "Now that the water is back up, it's like exploring a new lake all over again, which can lead to an accidental grounding or prop damage. It's a lot easier to call us than to ask a friend to come and find you and safely get you back to a marina or launch ramp," he adds.



LOOK OUT "BELLOW"

(excerpted from <u>BoatU.S. Trailering</u>, Aug-Sep, 2009, submitted by Charlie Cox)

Here's a statistic that will get your attention—and it's a statistic because boat owners didn't pay attention: Case files from BoatU.S. Marine Insurance reveal that 44% of sterndrive boats that sank at the dock had a leak in the bellows, the pleated rubber membrane that covers the engine and the submerged outdrive acting as a seal around the transom. In addition, leaking bellows have been the cause of 20% of sinkings when boats are underway.

There are two other kinds of bellows that can leak and possibly ruin a boat owners day: the U-joint bellows and the shift cable bellows are also made of accordion-like rubber and , like the bellows around the outdrive, can develop a tear that can result in water entering the engine, the bilge or both.

Boat manufacturers urge replacement of the bellows every five or six years because the rubber deteriorates over time. Prolonged exposure out of the water on a trailer or in dry storage can dry out the bellows to a point that when the sterndrive is raised or lowered, the rubber will rip or tear. Insurance files indicate that the owners never noticed the damage, proceeded to launch their boats, and suddenly noticed a lot of water in the engine compartment. Other case files are from boats kept in a marina that, over time, developed a torn bellows and took on water slowly. Besides normal wear and tear and deterioration from aging, muskrats have also been known to enjoy nibbling their way through bellows.

The key to protecting your boat from bellows-related damage is frequent inspections. Here's what to look for:

- 1. Inspect bellows closely for rips or tears in the material. Look closely in the folds or pleats in the rubber. A flashlight with a bright beam helps. If you find any damage, replace all bellows.
- 2. Put the outdrive all the way up and turn the helm to the left. Inspect the bellows closely. Then turn the helm to the right and repeat the process.
- 3. Check the clamps on the bellows to ensure they are intact and secure. If you're replacing bellows, replace the clamps as well.

AROUND THE WORLD ON SOLAR POWER

The futuristic-looking "Planet Solar," which is 100 percent powered by sunlight, is the brainchild of Swiss engineer Raphael Domjan, a former paramedic with a passion for innovative design and renewable energies


The 30-meter (97' 6") vessel is currently being built in Kiel, Germany, and will be finished early next year. If all goes according to plan, the boat will begin operation the summer 2010 -- first in European waters and then around the world. The following year it will make its around the world cruise.

The boat is expected to travel at up to 14 knots (26k/m) and would be the first solar-powered boat to travel at such high speeds. It is projected to be able to cross the Atlantic in just two weeks. Domjan hopes his

ambitious, \$11.5 million (€8 million) project will prove that boats can travel at high speeds without emitting any carbon dioxide.

"I want to show that we can change, that solutions exist and that it's not too late, "Domjan writes on his website.

Planet Solar will be covered in 470 square meters (4,964 sq. ft.) of solar panels -- the equivalent of two tennis courts. Twenty-three percent of absorbed sunlight will be converted into energy that the boat can run on, compared with 17 percent for average panels.

SALEM LADY JUMPS WAKES, BOAT JUMPS TREES

A Marblehead woman whose boat ended up in a tree in a Lafayette Street yard pleaded not guilty to drunken and unsafe boating charges yesterday.

Caroline Driscoll, 41, of 9 Ridge Road said nothing during a brief appearance in Salem District Court and was released on a \$1,000 personal surety bond by Judge Robert Cornetta.

Driscoll, whose blood was taken at Salem Hospital shortly after the crash, could face the suspension of her driver's license if her blood alcohol level was .08 or above, but prosecutor Caleb Weiner said he did not yet have the result of the blood tests. He will be allowed to ask for a license suspension once the test results are available.

Driscoll and her passenger, Chad Megis, 33, were thrown from the boat while Driscoll was allegedly "wake jumping" near other boats, according to a witness.

Driscoll's 24-foot boat continued on, however, eventually launching into the air and coming to rest some 100 feet inland and 25 feet up in some trees in the backyard of a home, according to a police report.

Police, including Salem Harbormaster Sgt. Peter Gifford, caught up with Driscoll in a boat at the dock at Osgood Park. Driscoll admitted to police that she had been the operator of the boat.



Afterthoughts

A few days ago, Ed Troncalli and I had the opportunity to assist Jeff Batson by providing some on-the-water training to a group of Sea Cadets.

We met at a dock at Aqualand a little after 9:00 on a dreary Sunday morning. It had been raining most of the night and the skies were heavily overcast with a 7-10 knot wind out of the southwest. It looked like it was going to dump buckets the whole time we were out but fortunately we only got an intermittent light drizzle.

The cadets looked none the worse for wear for having slept outdoors in the rain as they showed up in their Battle Dress Uniforms (BDUs) consisting of camo cargo pants, tunics and covers. We soon had all twenty cadets and a few of their adult leaders fitted with life jackets and on board our boats.

After a brief orientation to the layout of the boat, the location of safety and docking equipment, the operation of the navigation equipment and the helm controls, we assigned duties for casting off and getting underway. We headed out of the slip and into Flowery Branch Bay.

Once underway, we gave further explanation of operating the engine controls and the helm. Then we turned over the helm to the first cadet and asked him to come to a certain compass heading and hold it. After a few minutes, he handed over control to another cadet, and this routine continued until everyone had a chance to drive for a while and perform some basic maneuvers.

We then held a Man Overboard drill using a floating chair as the victim. Unfortunately, the lightweight chair caught the wind and took off like an Olympic swimmer. We were eventually successful in rescuing our victim, but only after an extended chase across the bay.

After our "man overboard" was safely back on board, we went back to the dock and the cadets headed off to strike their campsite.

Ed and I agree that we are confident that the future of the Republic will be safe with these fine young men and women in charge. Thanks to Jeff for his contributions to their training.
